

CALL FOR PROPOSALS

Advancing Ocean and River Alkalinity Enhancement Research in Canada September 2026

A. Call Overview

Meeting climate targets that keep warming below 2°C requires both deep reductions in greenhouse gas emissions and the removal of hundreds of billions of tonnes of CO₂ from the atmosphere this century. Ocean and River Alkalinity Enhancement (OAE and RAE, respectively) are among the most promising carbon dioxide removal (CDR) approaches: they accelerate a natural geological weathering process, converting oceanic dissolved CO₂ into bicarbonate that the ocean is expected to store stably on geologic timescales, while potentially counteracting local acidification.

Canada is uniquely positioned to continue to lead the next phase of OAE/RAE research. With the world's longest coastline, world-class marine research infrastructure, an established federal climate mandate, and globally-leading OAE/RAE deployments underway in Nova Scotia, Canada offers exceptional scientific, operational, and societal conditions for advancing OAE and RAE research. Together, these strengths position Canada to continue to generate the evidence needed to rigorously evaluate the role of OAE/RAE within a durable global CDR portfolio. This Call for Proposals (CFP), co-developed by Carbon to Sea Canada ([Carbon to Sea Initiative](#)) and the [Marine Environmental Observation Prediction and Response Network \(MEOPAR\)](#), seeks proposals that take advantage of that Canadian context to fundamentally advance understanding of OAE/RAE.

The call invites proposals that address three foundations of OAE/RAE research (safety, efficacy, and scalability) and advance one or more of the thematic research and development (R&D) priorities described in **Section B, below**. Proposals are encouraged from diverse geographies, ecosystems, and organizations across Canada.

We are committed to actively moving forward on the path of Truth and Reconciliation and advancing Equity, Diversity, Inclusion, and Accessibility (EDIA) initiatives in all our activities. Applicants are encouraged to engage with academic audiences and beyond, including Indigenous communities, ocean-impacted communities, industry, not-for-profits, policymakers, and equity-deserving groups (e.g., members of the 2SLGBTQIA+ communities, persons with a disability, racialized individuals, and women) in the ocean sector, to foster inclusive participation and amplify diverse voices in the ocean sector. Applications will be evaluated, in part, on their ability to engage diverse teams and audiences effectively, demonstrating a commitment to EDIA and Truth and Reconciliation principles.

B. Alignment with MEOPAR's Objectives and Science Strategy, and the Research and Development Priorities for OAE/RAE in Canada

Funding will be prioritized for projects that align with one or more of the strategic objectives below and contribute to addressing the identified knowledge gaps and strategic research priorities for OAE/RAE in Canada.

MEOPAR has identified the following objectives for which targeted funding will be provided:

1. Strengthen the evidence base for decision making and adaptation through development of improved tools, techniques, and strategies for ocean and coastal observation, prediction, and information sharing.
2. Increase economic opportunity, coastal community resilience, and marine ecosystem protection in the face of climate and technological change through end-user-driven science and novel collaborative structures.
3. Improve access to and use of ocean research infrastructures.

4. Diversify, develop, and broaden deployment of Canada's ocean-related research and innovation talent.

Project leads should consult the [MEOPAR Science Strategy 2025–2030](#) for further context and to ensure alignment with MEOPAR's long-term vision and core priorities.

MEOPAR's Science Strategy is marine-focused but acknowledges the important role that rivers and estuarine systems play in shaping marine ecosystems, communities, and industries. In this CFP, MEOPAR and Carbon to Sea are interested in advancing research on RAE projects that examine marine-terminating rivers, where the effects of alkalinity enhancement may be propagated into the estuarine/marine environment. Proposed RAE projects are expected to consider the marine system in their scope.

Knowledge Gaps and Strategic Research Priorities for OAE/RAE in Canada

Three thematic priorities, surfaced through sustained engagement with Canadian partners and collaborators across the OAE/RAE field, cover a range of research areas and strategic initiatives. The framing below identifies priority areas within the field and invites proposals that define the work most likely to generate impact. Applicants are not expected to address every theme. The intent is depth on a focused contribution, located clearly within a theme and tied to the Canadian context (see MEOPAR's Objectives and Science Strategy above). Additional detail on the thematic R&D priorities as well as several illustrative examples of interest can be found in the **Section B of the Application Guide**.

I. Measurements and models for Monitoring, Reporting, and Verification (MRV)

Quantification of CO₂ removal from OAE/RAE hinges on targeted measurements and accurate modelling. Advancements in measurements and models that underpin OAE MRV are essential for assessing the efficiency, durability, and scalability of OAE/RAE, while building scientific confidence and public trust needed for responsible deployment.

II. Environmental and ecological impact assessment

The ecological safety case for OAE/RAE rests on understanding how increases in alkalinity can drive changes in carbonate chemistry, and where relevant, how pathway-specific feedstock constituents (e.g., metals, nutrients), particles, or other aspects of alkalinity delivery affect marine and river systems under realistic field conditions. Exposure dynamics, recovery and reversibility, multi-stressor effects, indirect impacts and biogeochemical feedbacks, and the variability introduced by different ecosystems, seasons, and alkalinity delivery approaches must be further constrained at the appropriate spatial and temporal scales.

III. Governance, communities, and decision-making

OAE/RAE research and deployment occurs in places where people hold relationships with the natural environment that long predate climate interventions. The desirability, credibility, and legitimacy of OAE/RAE depends on meaningful engagement, relationship-building, and collaboration with Indigenous rights holders, host communities, and interested and affected parties, as well as an enabling environment of effective governance, fit-for-purpose regulation, institutional capacity, and robust social, governance, and economic evidence. Strengthening this evidence base across social, governance, and economic dimensions is essential to informing responsible research, policy development, and future deployment.

C. Structure of the Call

Projects may be up to 18 months in duration, from April 1, 2027, to October 31, 2028, with a maximum request of \$150,000. The total funding envelope for this call is approximately \$1M. Project leads are required to secure [matching funds \(cash or in-kind\)](#) from non-federal government sources at a minimum 0.3 : 1 matching ratio

(30 cents for every dollar requested from MEOPAR and Carbon to Sea Canada; see details in **Budget Section below**).

D. Funding Eligibility

The project lead must be eligible to be a grant-holder within their recipient organization. Eligible recipients of MEOPAR funds include Canadian post-secondary institutions, not-for-profit organizations, Indigenous organizations and governments, municipalities, research networks, public engagement networks, organizations and companies that deliver public engagement activities, or start-up companies (including those housed in Canadian post-secondary-linked incubators). Eligible recipients do not include federal departments, agencies, or Crown Corporations of the Government of Canada. E. Requirements of Funding

The project lead and their home organization will enter into an agreement with MEOPAR called an Ultimate Recipient Agreement (URA) that will enable the organization to pay for eligible project expenses. The URA identifies the funding schedule, reporting timeline, as well as the project's milestones/deliverables and their target completion dates.

F. Budget

Detailed budgets, with accompanying justifications, are required. **This includes a Project Budget (Appendix B/B1)** and a Partner Contribution Budget (**Appendix C**). Budgets must be submitted using the provided templates.

Overhead (indirect costs) are eligible for funding at a rate appropriate for the context of the project, up to a maximum of 15%. The rate must be established considering the scale of the project (i.e., not simply using a general flat-rate percentage charge [such as 15%] that does not consider project context). Applicants must provide a justification explaining how the funds will be used under this category, how each expense is calculated, and why it is required. Worksheet B1 (tab 2 in Appendix B) is provided to help identify eligible overhead expenses, calculate costs, and document the rationale and justification for each expense. If administrative support is required but not charged to the project, it may instead be described as an in-kind contribution to assist with the matched funding requirement.

For all other contributions, indicate whether partner support is cash or in-kind and whether it is expected or secured. A minimum ratio of 0.3 : 1 matched funding from non-federal sources is required for every dollar of funding requested through this call, and applications will be evaluated in part on the strength of their matched funding ratio.

G. Submission Procedure

Proposals will be submitted online through the MEOPAR portal at <https://meopar.smaply.ca/>. The portal will open on **September 16, 2026**. The submission deadline is **November 12, 2026 at 23:59 EST**.

I. Proposal Evaluation

Proposals will be assessed through an independent review process involving external experts. Reviewers will evaluate proposals using the criteria and scoring rubric provided below. The weighting assigned to each assessment component is outlined in the rubric and contributes to the overall proposal score.
